**APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

July 24, 2012 – Regular Meeting

Councilman Rilee made a motion to approve the above listed minutes. Councilman Zoschak seconded the motion.

**Mayor Hall amended the order of the agenda to allow Mr. Rath to provide an update on the odors emanating from the former Fenimore Landfill site.**

Mr. Rath reported that the NJDEP and the Township have issued Notices of Violation (NOV) to the property owner. The Owner has ten (10) days to abate the violation. This does not seem practical and will most likely be handled in court. The Township can issue fines up to \$1,100 per day. The Roxbury Health Department is going by the site every evening at around 5:00PM to inspect. The NJDEP has been to the site and walked the site over the last three days and will continue to investigate. The NJDEP feels the odor is not coming from the sludge but that the odor is coming from the construction debris that is being dumped at the site. Mr. Rath credited Mr. Kobylarz and the Sewer Department for investigating that the smell was not sewer related and Mr. Blood had the Natural Gas Company and Suburban Propane visit the site to be ruled out as the odor causation.

Mayor Hall noted that the reopening of the landfill is a NJDEP approved project, not a Township of Roxbury project.

Mayor Hall described the odor as “horrendous”.

Amy Overman, Chief of Staff to Senator Bucco, was at this meeting as a representative of the Senator’s office. Ms. Overman stated that the Senator is aware of the situation and he has been in contact with Bob Martin, the NJDEP commissioner, and is doing what he can to resolve this situation. Mr. Rath added that Ms. Overman is also a Roxbury resident and is living through this process with the rest of those in attendance.

Councilman Zoschak stated he has printed some photographs that a resident took from the site showing garbage being dumped. The photographs were passed around the Council room.

Deputy Mayor DeFillippo noted that the \$1,100.00 NOV fines are the maximum fine that the municipality can levy, but the NJDEP can levy substantially higher fines.

**Ronald Watson  
7 Nalron Drive, Ledgewood**

Mr. Watson commented on his own unofficial investigation of this project. He noted that the Sierra Club does not endorse this project (Councilman Rilee noted that the Club initially was in support, but has since retracted their support). Mr. Watson continued to discuss his unofficial findings at the site stating he has taken samples of debris from the landfill. His focus was on the retention pond and run off streams.

**Robert Mederos  
4 Nalron Drive, Ledgewood**

Mr. Mederos stated the source of the odor made him physically ill. Mr. Mederos feels the odor becomes exaggerated after the bulldozers start working around 6:30A.M. Mr. Mederos stated he has hunted this area for 30 years. He has noticed there is a stream that has now completely dry, another waterway oozing gunk, and tumors in the deer that have been hunted in the landfill area. He feels there must be water contamination affecting the wildlife and the trout from the pond could be contaminated to the point of affecting the annual fishing derby. He noted the Ledgewood area has many wells and is concerned about the contamination that may be taking place. He noted he accessed the property through the Ledgewood Pond area and saw no signs regarding “No Trespassing”.

Mayor Hall thanked Mr. Watson and Mr. Mederos and spoke about his personal experience smelling the odor from the site. Mr. Rath accepted the samples of dirt collected and presented by Mr. Watson and Mr. Mederos and said that he would give a portion of the sampling to the NJDEP and keep a portion for the Township of Roxbury. Mr. Bucco reminded the residents that the Landfill is private property and residents enter it at their own risk.

Mr. Rath commented that twenty five private wells have been tested and showed no organic concerns.

Mr. Rath said that the Township can arrange to have anyone's wells tested and to contact the health department if so desired.

Mr. Watson responded that he is fearful about the impact on future generations.

**John O'Neill**

**217 Mooney Road, Flanders**

Mr. O'Neill stated the smell is horrible. He expressed specific interest about the commencement of the access road & the date of the court hearing. Mr. Bucco stated that Judge Wilson has tentatively scheduled another court date for December 21, 2012 in Morristown. Mr. O'Neill stated there was a truck fire in front of his house on Thanksgiving Day and he feels speeding is still an issue. He has noticed a sharp decline in the police presence in the past three or four weeks.

Mr. Bucco advised that Mr. Bernardi relieved his previous attorney of his duties and is once again using Mr. Fredricks. Mr. Bucco met with Mr. Bernardi and Mr. Fredricks on Wednesday before Thanksgiving. Mr. Bucco is altering the agreement slightly and will provide a revised version Mr. Fredricks next week.

Mr. Rath said the Township was issued the permits for the Access Road, but the NJDEP has not responded to a request to extend the start date beyond the 30 day limit. The Township of Roxbury still needs a letter certifying the funds are available from the NJDEP. The certification of funds is needed before the project can begin.

Mr. Rath announced a possible Morris County Soil Conservation meeting on December 5, 2012. He encouraged the public to attend.

Mr. O'Neill referenced the alleged findings of Mr. Mederos and Mr. Watson stating that if cell phones are among the recent dumping, cadmium lead and contaminants may be contained in the samples they provided.

Deputy Mayor DeFillippo questioned the Friday, December 21st court hearing asking if there was another date scheduled regarding another aspect of the lawsuit. Mr. Bucco said yes, but it is a case that the Township is not involved with which is the Office of Administrative Law on SEP's alleged violations of the ACO agreement with the NJDEP. Mr. Bucco believes this court hearing will be rescheduled to occur after the December 21<sup>st</sup> state court hearing. He is waiting to hear from the Deputy Attorney General regarding the hearing date.

**Richard Cadogan**

**9 Nalron Drive, Ledgewood**

Mr. Cadogan asked why they aren't closing the landfill properly. Mr. Rath said that it is because the NJDEP has allowed Mr. Bernardi to bring in more than three times the amount of material needed to just cap the landfill. The argument is that construction debris is needed to grade the land adequately to make the ground stable enough to support the proposed solar farm. The NJDEP saw this project as a way to make the capping of this facility economically viable because there are currently no readily available funds to cap.

Deputy Mayor DeFillippo pointed out that there is no application on file for a solar project.

Mr. Rath added that this is only Phase I of a project that consists of IV Phases.

Councilman Zoschak pontificated that this is not the correct way to close a landfill by any stretch of the imagination.

Mayor Hall reiterated that this is not a project that the Township wanted or had any part of. He also stated the NJDEP does have some legal action regarding failure to

meet their obligations under the ACO which is the main governing agreement. The first step is the December 21<sup>st</sup> meeting.

Mr. Cadogan said that the damage is visible. He feels the soil should be tested. Mr. Rath said the 2005 report stated that the landfill was not a hazard. Mr. Rath said that the Township would test any samples that are provided. Landfills cause a lot of problems and the Township will keep testing. He pointed out there is a lot of iron from a lot of mines in that area and that iron leaching causes discoloration of water and earth.

**Anthony Fiore**  
**7 Fox Chase Lane, Ledgewood**

Mr. Fiore asked what the ramifications are if the NOV is disregarded. Mr. Rath stated that the next step would be going to court. The NOV is issued per occurrence and Mr. Rath noted that it is vitally important for all the residents to continue to call 1-877-WARNDEP.

Residents claimed that they called that number and were told that the Township of Roxbury must have approved this project. Mr. Rath stated this is an untruth.

**Denise Squires**  
**128 Whisper Way East, Ledgewood**

Ms. Squires spoke about her concerns regarding the landfill. Her house was filled with a strong, gas like odor.

Ms. Squires stated that she packed up and moved into her mother's home because she, her husband, infant, and toddler were breathing in what they believed to be a gas leak. She went through the process of calling the Township of Roxbury, Senator Bucco, and the NJDEP and feels confused by the NJDEP. She feels the NJDEP is putting the onus on the residents as opposed to taking responsibility as the agency to protect the residents from exactly this type of situation.

Ms. Squires mused, "How do you trust the NJDEP?" The first time she called, the person she spoke with had no knowledge regarding this situation and was told someone would contact her. No one contacted her.

She and her children have experienced health related respiratory issues that she attributes to the landfill. She and her husband feel like they are being forced out of their homes – she is terrified and will be moving out of Roxbury as soon as possible.

Mayor Hall recapped the recent occurrences since the odor was noticed. Mayor Hall agreed that the process and procedure that the NJDEP is requiring is absurd. He said that he called the NJDEP immediately and expressed his views.

Councilman Rilee explained that it is important to have these issues documented for use in the court case. He noted that the owner of SEP is very well-versed in dealing with both the NJDEP and the legal system. Councilman Rilee agreed 100% that this is redundant and the NJDEP should have inspectors on site.

Mr. Bucco explained a formal complaint has to be made to be used as proof. The odor may come and go and may not be present at the time an inspector is on site. There has to be proof that the odor was documented off site in the event that the violation is challenged.

Deputy Mayor DeFillippo mentioned that some residents may be fearful of retribution by the property owner. Attorney Bucco said that threats of that nature are an entirely different aspect and in the event any threats are made the police should be notified.

**Frank Corsi**  
**4 Phyllis Drive, Succasunna**

Mr. Corsi asked if the Township could assist with coordinating or organizing the complaint system.

Mayor Hall said that all the information regarding Fenimore and from the NJDEP is on the Township website.

Deputy Mayor DeFillippo said in addition to the link on the Township website information is posted on the Township Facebook account and as a newsflash on the Township website. Additionally she noted that every Council member has email and is willing to assist any resident with this process. It is important to document the claims of physical illness. Health issues should be reported to both the NJDEP and the Roxbury Health Department.

Mr. Rath's reaffirmed Deputy Mayor DeFillippo's statement and stressed the importance of reporting illnesses to the Township Health Department. They can take action independently of the NJDEP.

Deputy Mayor DeFillippo stated that this is not only a Health and Quality of Life issue, but it has an economic impact and creates a stigma against this Township. She is mortified by the affect this odor issue is having on the Township of Roxbury resulting in damage to property values, businesses, our children, and ourselves.

Councilman Zoschak questioned the level he and the Township of Roxbury are able to assist constituents in light of the Township, as well as Mr. Rath's personally, being slapped with a lawsuit by SEP. He questioned how he can guide constituents without creating an opening for additional law suits. Attorney Bucco replied yes; guide the constituents through the process but practice care to make sure you provide accurate and verified information. Pointing out that SEP is very savvy regarding this area of law.

**Edward Byron**

**Trustee of the Ledgewood Baptist Church**

Mr. Byron stated that, ironically, his congregation's busiest gathering time is when the odor seems to be at its strongest. The fumes cause eye rubbing and parishioners do not want to come to church anymore as a result of the fumes.

Mr. Byron applauded the municipality for its efforts to fine \$1,100.00 a day but feels it is a joke compared to the profit SEP is making from the tipping fees.

For the record, Mr. Byron informed the public that the phone number to report complaints to is a 24-hour a day line. He was made aware of this when he reported the odor issue the morning after an occurrence. He was told to call at the time of the alleged violation, even if it occurs in the middle of the night. Someone would be dispatched to the site at the time of the call.

Mayor Hall reiterated the importance of reporting health related issues.

Deputy Mayor DeFillippo recommended that the pastor go back and get records of the dates and write a letter to the NJDEP about past occurrences. He should include in his letter that he has only recently been made aware of how and who to report his concerns to.

**Ronald Watson**

**7 Nalron Drive, Ledgewood**

Mr. Watson asked where the additional forty two (42) acres of future site involvement are located as they relate to the already involved sixteen acres (16).

Councilman Zoschak referred Mr. Watson to [livemaps.com](http://livemaps.com) to view the entire site.

Mr. Rath's stated that the entire site is comprised of approximately ninety (90) acres. Mr. Bucco stated that the part being worked on now is like the hole in a donut.

Mr. Watson noted what he perceives as another possible violation of work done on the lower end of the project.

He asked for air quality testing to determine what particulates the residents are breathing in. Mr. Rath's stated it is one of the requirements, but we have found out it is often not done.

Mr. Watson questioned the reality of seeing an electric benefit from this solar farm. He also wondered if the NJDEP is being pushed by federal government policies. He has been informed that the policy in the United States is to open old dumps for solar farms.

Councilman Rilee responded to his concerns. He pointed out that the federal policy to get landfills cleaned up is not necessarily horrific. He said this project is horrific. This project is the problem because of the residential location and the fact that the impact of the residents was not taken into consideration.

Mr. Watson questioned the wisdom of allowing SEP to build the access road based on the blatant disregard for the ACO that SEP has demonstrated.

Mr. Rath's stated that the Township designed the road, not SEP. Mayor Hall stated that the NJDEP did not come up with the idea of the access road, the Township did. Mr. Watson asked what impact the access road would have on Route 46 traffic.

Mayor Hall said that there is no good solution. This is just a better alternative, but not a great solution. This is the best alternative to ensure the safety and quality of life for the Township of Roxbury residents.

Mr. Watson ended with reminding Council the importance of air quality testing and the desire to have the results available to the public.

**Anthony Fiore**

**7 Fox Chase Lane, Ledgewood**

Mr. Fiore asked if the Township has any additional electronic signs that could be placed near the Rt. 10, Rt. 46 junction with the 877- Warn DEP number illuminated.

Mr. Rath's complimented the good suggestion and he will look into posting the number.

**Robert Mederos**

**4 Nalron Drive, Ledgewood**

Mr. Mederos echoed the need for air sampling noting the number of residents at this meeting with similar physical complaints.

**Mayor Hall closed the Public Portion**

**Mayor Hall allowed for a brief recess**

**At 9:00PM Mayor Hall returned to the meeting**

**Mayor Hall amended the order of the agenda to address the following item listed under New Business/Old Business under REPORTS OF COUNCIL LIAISON REPRESENTATIVES, COUNCIL COMMITTEES AND NEW BUSINESS/OLD BUSINESS**

**Stormwater Training by Ferriero Engineering**

Mr. Ferriero commended the Township on its attentiveness to stormwater management training. He advised that stormwater management cannot control flooding but without it, it can become worse.

Mr. Ferriero spoke about the budget issues regarding stormwater management. He compared his proposal of stormwater management funding to the way the NJDOT supplies Local Aid to assist municipalities with road maintenance. He feels there should be a similar funding source for stormwater management maintenance and wants municipal support. Mr. Ferriero noted that maintenance is critical. Maintenance must be done to stormwater basins or it's a violation.

Mayor Hall noted that the basins are mostly privately owned. Mr. Rath noted that the Township has budgeted for maintenance this year.

Councilman Rilee spoke about the lack of legislation to assist municipalities to implement enforcement.

Mr. Ferriero's opinion is that Developers should put up a performance bond and a two year maintenance bond to ensure at least two years of paid maintenance.

Councilman Schmidt asked Mr. Rath for a list of all retention (detention) basins in the Township and ownership of said basins.

Councilman Zoschak informed those in attendance that the planning board no longer accepts basins from private owners. Private owners should be reminded they have an obligation to maintain their basins.

Mr. Kobylarz also noted the stormwater quality chambers also need to be maintained. Enforcement has not been addressed since 2006.

Mayor Hall thanked Mr. Ferriero as the discussion ended.

Mr. Kobylarz, Township Engineer/Director of Utilities, Dept. Chief Kirk Keyes, Bob Hackett, Company No. 2 Fire Chief Joe Perfetti, Chairman, and George Reed, along with two others formed the Building Committee for the Company #2 Annex project.

Mr. Kobylarz informed Council members that the cost for the project far exceeded cost estimates.

George Reed said that estimate is not realistic and it should be within the \$800,000.00 range. He feels that it should go out to bid. Discussion occurred regarding the bid process. Chief Keyes spoke from personal experience as a member of the construction committee. He stated that he rebids jobs regularly and rebidding is not a deterrent but a common practice. He also encouraged Council to act quickly while work is scarce to keep costs down.

Mr. Rath informed Council that of the \$800,000 appropriated, approximately \$50,000 has been spent on design work, \$200,000 was supposed to come from a developers contribution from The Villages. Mr. Rath stated that the money could come from the Capital Trust noting if and when The Villages is ever built, the funds could be reimbursed. It was decided funding merits future discussions. Mr. Rath said that he would be meeting with the Fire Chiefs on Thursday and may revise the Capital plan to accommodate the Annex.

Council authorized the preparations of the bid documents.

Mr. Reed asked if any of the Port Morris firehouse sale monies could be used to help fund the annex project. Mr. Rath answered negatively because the Port Morris firehouse money is to go into the COAH funds as previously decided and that was taken into consideration when the \$800,000 was appropriated.

The final design will be provided to Council in the November 30, 2012 Communications packet.
